Trail Trimming Efficiency

SCTB's efficiency improved in 2022 thanks to a combination of donations and CPW partnership, improving SCTB's tool arsenal and maintenance capacity.



Brush Trimmer Upgrades

Community donations allowed SCTB to fund the purchase of six steel-blade powered brush cutters. These trimmers have massively increased the efficiency of SCTB volunteers and the overall trail experience at Lake Pueblo State Park.

ATV Brush Mower

Lake Pueblo State Park (Colorado Parks & Wildlife) invested in a 48" wide brush mower and ATV for SCTB trail maintenance. The mower dramatically reduces the number of labor hours required to perform the annual trimming necessary throughout the system.



Beulah: Carhart Trail Improvements

Donations and grants made over \$14,000 of professional trail improvements possible on the Carhart Trail in Beulah, Colorado!



Funding Trail Improvements

The Pueblo Mountain Park's Carhart Trail, completed in 2019, was hand built by SCTB with over 1,500 volunteer hours and community donations.

In 2022, SCTB funded \$14,225 of professional trail equipment and labor to widen portions of the tread, improve backslope stability in steep terrain, and add rolling grade reversals to improve drainage. Work was performed by Timberline TrailCraft.

SCTB received grants from CPW, San Isabel Electric Association and Basin Electric Power Cooperative to fund this work . This project represents a continuing partnership with NWDC to maintain and improve the trails at the Pueblo Mountain Park



Tool Maintenance and Organization

Trail tools take a beating. In 2022 SCTB performed maintenance on our fleet of trail tools and upgraded our tool shed located at Lake Pueblo State Park

Tool Safety and Maintenance

Like the trails, our fleet of tools needs TLC too. One of our Second Sunday work days this year was dedicated to tool repairs, tuning and sharpening.



Tool Storage Upgrades

CPW provides SCTB a tool storage shed located at Lake Pueblo State Park. In 2022, SCTB installed racks and hooks to organize our fleet of trail tools.

Lake Pueblo: Major Trail Improvements

SCTB guided and oversaw \$181,275 of contracted trail work and signage improvements made possible by CPW funds, community support, and volunteers



Improving sustainability:

SCTB supported contractor Singletrack Trails to complete work on key realignments of South Shore, Conduit, Arkansas Point, and Rollercoaster trails to improve trail sustainability and accessibility.



Meeting Modern Standards:

SCTB supported contractor Singletrack Trails in the fall of 2022 as they updated aged Technical Trail Features at Lake Pueblo State Park to improve user experience and meet modern trail feature standards.

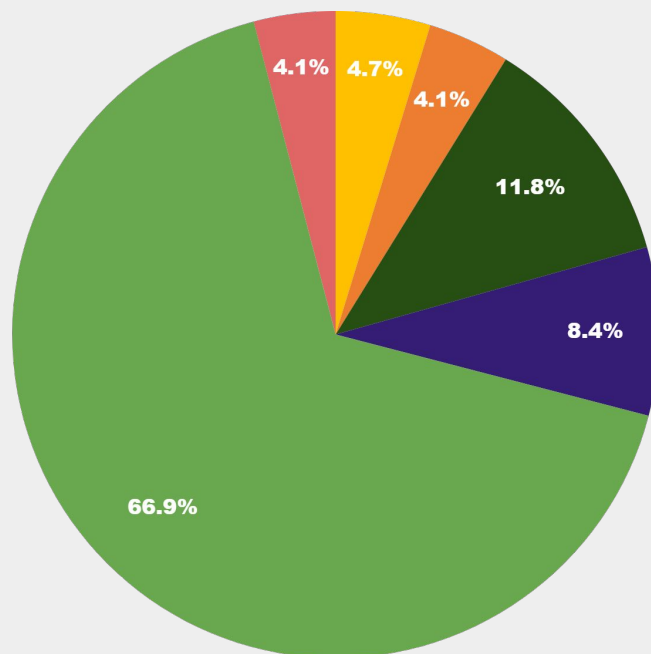


Financials at a Glance

As a volunteer run organization, SCTB is dedicated to being a good steward of the trails as well as the donor and grantor funds making our work possible.

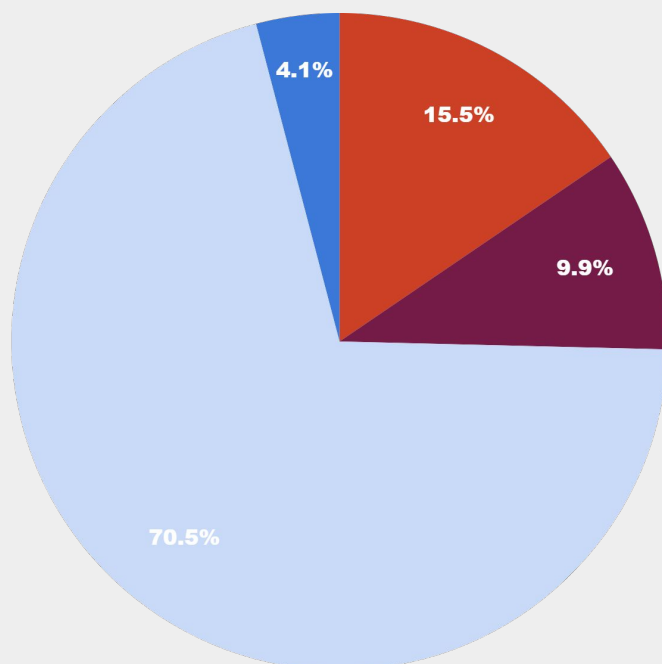

- **Membership Gifts** \$ 871.48



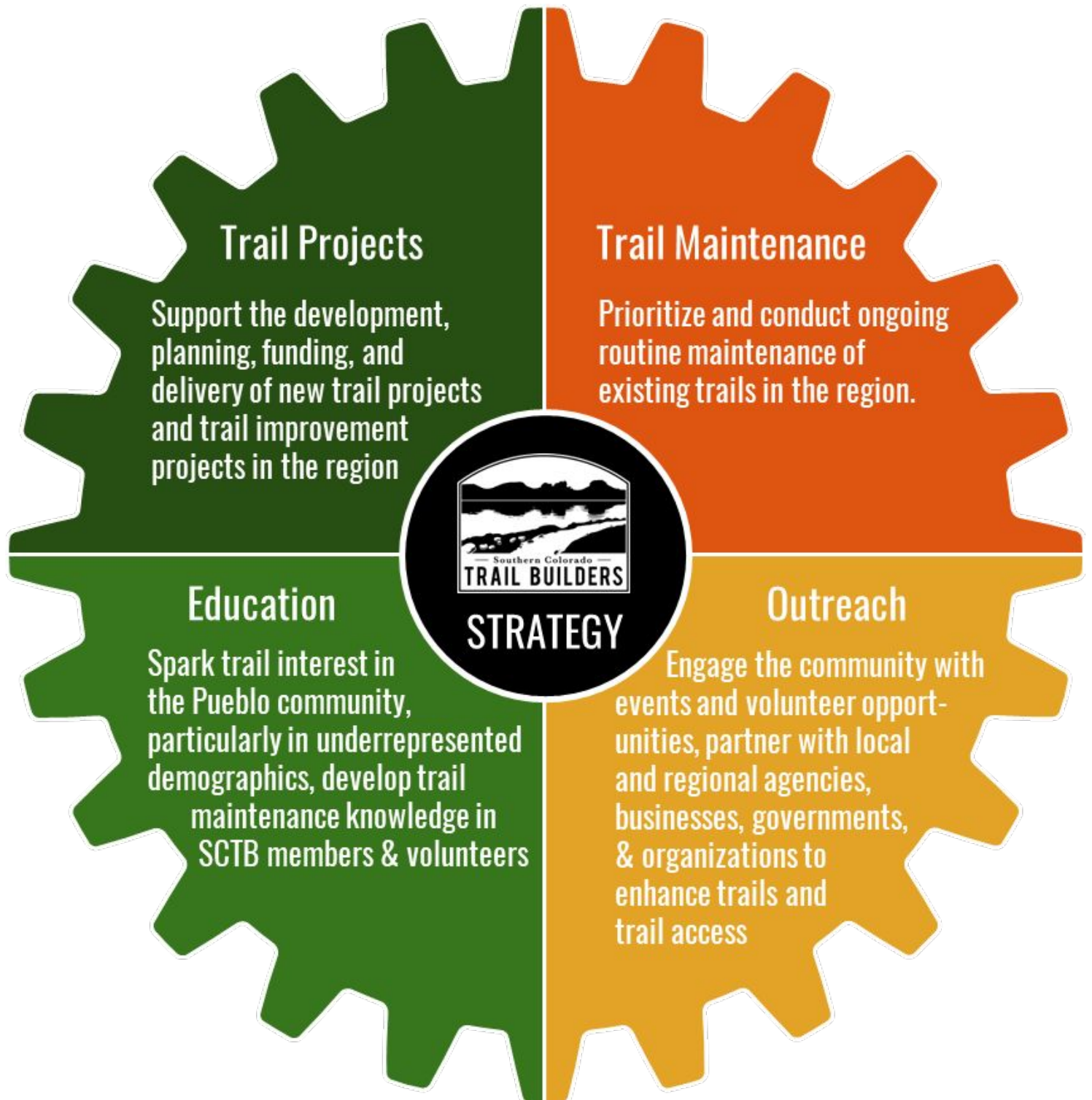
